

Then interior designer Debra Gildersleeve isn't taking her Sea Ray out to Claudio's or grabbing pizza and wine at Macari Vineyards, she's hosting her family at home in Mattituck. With four generations living out East, it's always a party. A native of Long Island, Gildersleeve is firmly rooted in the North Fork. As owner of Renee's (reneesmattituck.com), the beloved fashion and furniture boutique, she's an integral force to the interior design of homes on the East End. Her own five-bedroom house, which she built more than 25 years ago, is no exception.

It just feels inviting. With an open floor plan and the kitchen as the default hangout, one can see why, at any given time, dozens of family members are swarming the space for a casual feast.

Gildersleeve's husband of 32 years, Bill, is the king of marinades and
